

Fun Falcon Facts

- The peregrine falcon became extirpated in Virginia in the mid 1960's.
- The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries began reintroducing the peregrine falcon in 1978.
- Peregrine falcons feed primarily on small birds.
- When falcons dive to catch a small bird they have been clocked at 200 mph!
- The female falcon is about a 1/3 larger than the male.
- Falcons once nested on the cliffs in Virginia's mountains they now nest on city buildings, bridges and other tall structures as well as cliffs.
- In cities, falcons use special boxes placed on the roofs of buildings to nest in. These are called hacking boxes.
